Over the past year, many of us have faced disruptive and uncertain economic times. As a result, many UUs have asked for more time to assess how much they can commit to the Legacy Capital Campaign.

Although, the economy is not yet fully recovered, the economic uncertainty has lifted and we are now in a much better position to make the legacy commitment. We are asking that you do so now.

As members of First Church, it is imperative that we support its future. The purpose of the Legacy Capital Campaign is to build a new campus, and a new chapel, which includes renovating and repurposing the existing building. This will create a church that is a model of energy efficiency, sustainability, and green viability. Ultimately, we hope with the fulfillment of this legacy, to build a stronger community that continues to grow and flourish through ministry, programming, and

community service, while continuing to be a voice of progressive thought and action.

This September we will be renewing our commitment:

- to receive a pledge of support from every member household
- to break ground on the new facility by March 2010 to take advantage of dramatically reduced building costs - a reduction of over \$1 million
- to ensure that future generations will have a thriving and vibrant Unitarian community

During September, volunteers will contact every member who has not yet pledged. We ask that you respond to their request by discussing what you can commit to over the next 4 year period to help us ensure the success of our legacy project.

## Reverently Yours

Even well into my professional life, at this time in the calendar year I get a queasy feeling in my stomach that extends back to my Kindergarten experience and every subsequent year when a new school or church year is about to break: How will

the new year turn out; will I be able to keep up; will the other girls and boys like me; will I be made to look stupid. My stomach has never handled the looming uncertainties well. But somehow, miraculously, after the first day of school or church, the gut anxieties melt away, and confidence in the upcoming year is restored.

Jitters are natural, especially when hundreds of Unitarians reconvene for church bringing thousands of new ideas with them on how to make the church experience better. And following GA, we now have a million new ideas to incorporate into our church life with the minister wondering: How will this all come together?

Let me introduce two areas that will represent a marked change to the upcoming church year (and I'm just scratching the surface). For five great years, LeeAnn Williams has served as our Director of Religious Education. We have loved her and learned from her; she has led us through countless intergenerational socials, and Christmas Eve Pageants. She motivated our high school kids to raise monies to send them on mission trips to do good works; she charmed the coming of age group to raise money for their annual pilgrimage to Boston. The past five years have been productive and warm. LeeAnn, however, has climbed the next rung of the professional ladder and moved to a larger church with more opportunities in which to excel. (Had she stayed, I might have even

joined her knitting group, but an opportunity was lost.) The main thing is that she moved with very good feelings in her heart towards this church, and she's probably, at this very moment, facing larger jitters in her stomach than ever before.

We are truly blessed in that Mary Kroener-Ekstrand and Nicole Droistch, both professionals in child development with huge hearts and personal experience in our RE program, will serve as acting DRE's for this coming year. They are not the type to simply offer a patch job to tide things over. Mary and Nicole are highly motivated to produce innovative change and lead our Religious Education program to uncharted levels. They both bring a breadth of experience, a mountain of enthusiasm, and will offer First Church a superb program. They might be experiencing a little queasy stomach themselves. It's that time of year.

Secondly, our congregation will learn increasingly more about the new UUA program just launched called Standing on the Side of Love. It offers a huge framework for social justice issues. I had the honor of accepting a UUA trip to Minneapolis this summer to work on media training with a top consultant from New York. Members of our congregation are currently engaged with the program and will present its ideas in a worship service in October.

Every new church year begins as potential for the most excitement ever. It usually does get pretty exciting which helps dissipate the pit lodged in the stomach. But this year - wow. I'm breathless. It's going to be fun, meaningful, inspiring. And I didn't even mention the choir going to Carnegie Hall in June. If I look a bit pale on that first Sunday back you'll understand. I should have my color back by the last hymn. TRG



## Board Walk

The new church year is upon us. The Board of Trustees enthusiastically welcomes everyone back as we get into the swing of things. The following is a brief summary of issues the Board has been working on since the beginning of the summer.

The summer afforded us the time to welcome and orient new board members Clea Major, Julie Peaslee, and Markus Vodosek, and say thank you to those leaving the Board: Julie Swaner and Bill Ohlsen. We established Board Liaisons to each of the many church committees. Some of our key committees required some new charters and membership as we are evolving.

The Board was very busy in preparing for and carrying out key tasks for General Assembly (GA). Many on the Board dedicated additional time as delegates for our congregation at UUA plenary sessions and attended educational sessions. GA gave us all a fuller appreciation of how we as a congregation are connected to the bigger community of our religion and organization.

We further examined our financial picture compared to our pledge numbers. Continued generous giving from the congregation leaves me optimistic about our financial status for this coming year.

We have been establishing policies and procedures to address issues as they arise so that we can more efficiently and consistently make future decisions.

We selected congregants to attend Russell Lockwood Leadership School, put on by the Mountain Desert District.

LeeAnn Williams, Director of Religious Education, resigned. We hired two acting co-directors, Mary Kroener-Ekstrand and Nicole Droistch, for the 2009-10 year while we work to hire a replacement. We thank LeeAnn for her stellar service.

The Board approved the hiring of a grant writer, Barry Bonifas, for our capital campaign.

Finally, we have been studying and discussing more effective ways of governing our current and future church. We have found that our By-laws, mission statement, and organizational structure need to be updated to more clearly define our church's purpose in our community and how we will carry out that purpose by better delineating and, in some cases, redefining roles and responsibilities of church leadership. Most important in this effort will be the Board's vision to promote an enduring and sustainable institution that changes peoples' lives in a positively profound way through Unitarian Universalist Principles. This process will, no doubt, be a fairly rigorous one that will take many months to develop and will involve the congregation's input. I will expound upon this in future publications.

I am honored by your trust in me as President. I thank the Board and Tom Goldsmith for their many hours and dedication to assure our church's success. I look forward to our successful new church year.

## Volunteer Opportunities

Environmental Ministry

There are many opportunities for getting involved in the church's Environmental Ministry. And the start of the church year is a great time to jump in and help out. Here are some volunteering options:



**Recycling Team** – Help the church recycle by volunteering to empty recycling and/or compost into the appropriate outside containers. Help is also needed with scheduling recycling volunteers for this weekly effort.

**Green Sanctuary** – The church is working on becoming a Unitarian Universalist Green Sanctuary – a church that “walks its talk” in terms of energy conservation and our ecological footprint. Volunteer to serve on the Green Sanctuary Committee if you are interested in finding ways to save energy and reduce the church's ecological footprint.



**Garden Group** – Help out in the church vegetable garden and reconnect with Mother Earth. Garden work parties are on the first Sunday of the month – during growing season – which we hope we will be successful in extending this year with the help of some plastic sheeting and hoops.

**Environmental Ministry Table** – Environmental Ministry staffs a regular table on Sundays in Elliot Hall to answer questions and provide information and to serve as a gathering spot during coffee hour for environmental discussions. Volunteer to help staff this table or to coordinate the table staffing schedule.



**Communication** – Updating and maintaining the Environmental Ministry website, electronic mailing list, and volunteer list are volunteer op-

portunities that can be done from your personal computer. Writing articles for *The Torch* on environmental issues or about upcoming Environmental Ministry events is another way to contribute.



**Lectures/Videos/Discussions** – Environmental Ministry sponsors programs on environmental topics of interest to our members and the community at large. Volunteer to assist with planning and hosting these programs.

**Environmental Education** – Environmental Ministry offers courses, book discussions, and workshops throughout the year. Volunteer to teach, coordinate, or arrange one or more of these educational opportunities for children, youth, and/or adults.



**Environmental Action** – Environmental Ministry is actively engaged in local, national, and global environmental action. Volunteer in our efforts to support Tim DeChristopher in putting climate change on trial this fall; advocate for strong legislation to address the climate crisis as we move toward Copenhagen in December; participate in planning SLC local actions for the 350: International Day of Action for Climate Justice (October 24<sup>th</sup>); support passage of America's Red Rock Wilderness Act; support ratification of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty; and participate in the development of a UUA Environmental Justice Guide.

# 350 24 OCTOBER 2009

## INTERNATIONAL DAY OF CLIMATE ACTION

**Save this date - October 24, 2009 and plan to join us in downtown Salt Lake City for this international day of action for climate justice.**

In a landmark series of studies [<http://www.columbia.edu/~jeh1/>], NASA climatologist, James Hansen and his team have shown that if we let the amount of carbon in the atmosphere top 350 parts per million, we can't have a planet "similar to the one on which civilization developed and to which life on earth is adapted." Bill McKibben, author of *Deep Economy*, *Enough*, and *The End of Nature*, came here to Salt Lake City and spoke at our Summer Forum about the significance of this number, 350.

**The bad news is we're already past this number** — we're at 390 parts per million, which is why the Arctic is melting, why drought is spreading across the planet, why people are already dying from diseases like dengue fever and malaria occurring in places where they've never been seen before.

**The good news: that number gives us a target to aim for.** When the world's leaders meet in Copenhagen in December to reach agreement on a new climate treaty, we need them to go further than they've planned to go: we need to make sure they'll pay attention to the latest science and put forward a plan that gets us back to safety.

People in communities around the globe are planning actions to focus our leaders' attention on getting us back to 350. Our goal is to change the conversation and the results in Copenhagen, improving our chance for a livable future. Planning for our Salt Lake City actions has been happening this summer here at First Unitarian Church. An organizing group, brought together by Peaceful Uprising, with representatives from a broad spectrum of environmental and social justice groups began meeting here this summer and is putting the SLC event together. ## Kidology and G Force

Animal Ministry



The movie *G-Force* has finally come out with a teaser trailer, how cute. Looks like the plot of the movie is about some smart gerbils doing stuff, to be honest I'm disappointed. Why, oh why Disney, do you keep

on producing animals movies. I think they should go back to the classics.

Despite what kids see in the movie, guinea pigs are fragile creatures that require special care for survival. But real-life guinea pigs are nowhere near as tough as their fictional counterparts — they can't even survive falls or rough handling from young children, let alone survive in the wild.

That's got experts worried about an inevitable increase in the popularity of these quirky little animals as pets. Domesticated since 5000 BC, guinea pigs were bred for certain desirable qualities like fur color, size and temperament, which has resulted in remarkable docility but also a fragility that makes them susceptible to disease and completely dependent on proper care from humans for survival.

While many children will undoubtedly beg their parents to get one as a pet after seeing *G-Force*, the 'proper care' part of owning a guinea pig is not as simple as it may seem. They need a constant supply of the right food — hay, vegetables and vitamin C, all of which are provided in guinea pig food pellets — and must be kept in a fairly temperature-stable environment, as anything

over 80 degrees Fahrenheit can cause dehydration. If you forget to feed them or fail to keep them cool on a hot day, they're toast.

In the movie, the *G-Force* guinea pigs are seen using hamster balls, but potential pet owners shouldn't confuse what's okay for hamsters with what's okay for guinea pigs. Unlike hamsters and mice, guinea pigs don't have the flexible spines necessary to use a ball or wheel. They also require special bedding, as the aromatic oils in cedar and pine bedding irritate their sensitive upper respiratory systems.

Even if guinea pigs could really walk around on their hind legs and carry guns, they wouldn't fare well being handled by small children without careful adult supervision. Falling a small distance — like, from a 5-year-old's arms onto the floor — could cause paralysis that eventually leads to death.

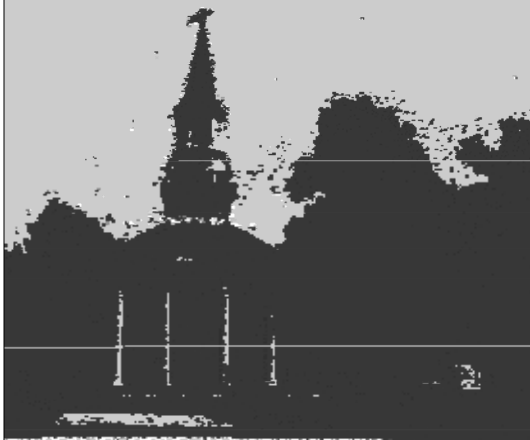
