## Environmental Ministry Updates

Just what is Environmental Ministry up to these days? Well ... here are some updates about what we are watching and what we are doing ... and some previews of what's ahead:

- **COP 20 – Lima, Peru** – News out of COP20, indicates that UN Climate negotiators dropped the ball in Lima—now it's up to the grassroots to pick it up. Paraphrasing Rising Tide North America: *The draft agreement is narrowly focused on unenforceable commitments to reduce greenhouse gas emissions that won't begin till after 2020 and won't keep temperature rises below 2° Celsius, or keep the extractive industries from expanding and cooking the planet, and will do next to nothing to help poor nations adapt to climate change and sustainably lift their people out of poverty. BUT, the good news is ... outside COP20 ... "Thousands of people, representing indigenous communities and their allies from all over Latin America and the world came together for the Cumbre De Los Pueblos, (People's Summit)." - **Keystone XL Pipeline** - Keystone XL is back in the news. On Dec 8<sup>th</sup>, President Obama made some of his strongest and clearest remarks about the Keystone XL tar sands pipeline yet. The President seems committed to the State Department process – waiting for their recommendations before making his final decision. - **Utah Tar Sands** – For 5 months, this summer and fall, people were on the Tavaputs Plateau in the Book Cliffs of Eastern Utah, holding vigil on the land where U.S. Oil Sands is attempting to open up the first commercial tar sands mine in the United States. The U.S. Oil Sands proposed project is located on land straddling the boundary of the Uintah and Ouray Reservation. There were 26 arrests this summer resisting this operation which is already increasing air pollution, devastating the land, and increasing carbon emissions, contributing to climate change. - **Move to Amend** – Mayor Ralph Becker and the Salt Lake City Council signed a joint resolution on Tues, Dec 9th recognizing opposition to the 2010 "Citizens United"

In this season of delight, let me throw one more gem your way. Much has been written and discussed about the high school senior prepared to volunteer for a service project organized by her school's National Honor Society. She

went to the South Towne Expo Center to help raise money for Primary Children's Hospital at their Festival of Trees, only to be turned away at the door for not wearing a dress. She showed up very professionally dressed in a pantsuit, but what is good enough for Hillary apparently will not satisfy the "standards" of the festival's women's Board.

The chairwoman could not have been more cliché when she actually said, "Once someone sees someone wearing pants then everyone thinks that would be accepted." Of course it would be horrible to imagine young women representing the National Honor Society wearing pants in the year 2014 in order to raise over a million dollars for hospitalized children. What is the world coming to?

But the kicker of the whole thing, of which I and truly all of us should be most proud, is the fact that the young woman denied her volunteer hours is Ellie Kaiser, raised in our church's RE program. She interviewed on TV and with the press with complete equanimity, totally poised, and confident. She claimed the dress code was sexist and punitive. Ellie still felt supportive of Primary Children's Hospital (which does not require women to wear skirts), but would not continue to support the Festival of Trees.

Ellie is following in the footsteps of Unitarian feminists like Susan B. Anthony. We probably taught her that or at least conveyed the values of total equality among the sexes. If

you have ever wondered what happens to our children when they go through Sunday School and are then released unto the world, we now see that we have impressed them with values that will help them carry on our progressive values.

Thank you Ellie for standing up for what is right and for being eloquent in your protest. But the next time you find yourself in such a position, and the media is drawn to your attention, put in a plug for the First Unitarian Church. Something to the order of: "I'd like to thank all my teachers at the First Unitarian Church."

Maybe we should all thank our Sunday school teachers for turning our young men and women into people who make us proud.

Supreme Court decision that opened funding floodgates in political campaigns. As a result, Salt Lake City joins over 600 U.S. cities opposed to the Supreme Court ruling. *"This marks the end of Phase One of the Move to Amend, Utah Chapter effort. And is the beginning of Phase Two, which seeks an ordinance to ban contributions by corporations at the city level and limit individual contributions to no more than \$500."*

• **Divestment** – On the home front, Environmental Ministry is preparing to present a Divestment Workshop at the January 2015 meeting of Utah Interfaith Power & Light and to make a proposal for a similar workshop to be held at the Parliament of Religions which will be here in SLC in October 2015. Nationally and internationally, 350.org and its partners have called on people everywhere to take part in the first ever Global Divestment Day this coming Feb 13 & 14, taking their fossil fuel divestment campaigning to a new level: <http://gofossilfree.org/category/global-divestment-day/> More as our Salt Lake City action plan develops.

• **Green Sanctuary** – We are making progress on Green Sanctuary – the UUA program through which we examine our current environmental impacts and move towards more sustainable practices in ways grounded in Unitarian Universalism. We are working on some fun ways to engage in this effort and hope to be able to get everyone involved. The program has 4 focus areas: environmental justice, worship and celebration, religious education, and sustainable living. As part of the sustainable living focus, Environmental Ministry has pulled together a collection of dishes, bowls, utensils and cloth napkins to accommodate our full Solstice Celebration ... we now have enough to feed 150! Less waste and an array of colors and patterns to brighten our celebration.
